

Introduction


In the spring of 2022 the Clinton County Health Department (CCHD) surveyed Clinton County residents to provide perspective about community health. Residents were asked to identify features of a strong, vibrant, healthy community; for their opinions on health, social and environmental challenges in the community; to identify health and social challenges and any barriers to medical care experienced by themselves or a family member within the past year; and, for demographic information about individual respondents and their households. The summary below outlines what respondents who indicated they reside in the Town of Clinton identified as features, challenges or barriers and highlights how they compare to the responses of all Clinton County respondents.

Findings

A total of 1,081 responses were received from Clinton County residents. Twenty-six (26) of the respondents indicated they reside in the Town of Clinton.

Demographics of Survey Respondents

The overall demographics of survey respondents who reside in the Town of Clinton varied only slightly from those of Clinton County respondents overall. Almost seventy percent of survey respondents (69.23%) identified as female, 19.23% of respondents identified as male, and 3.85% identified as nonbinary (7.69% of respondents chose not to answer this question). In regards to age, the majority of respondents were ages 25-44 (38.46%), followed by ages 45-64 (34.62%), 80 years and older (15.38%), and ages 65-79 (11.54%). There were no responses from individuals age 24 and younger. All respondents indicated that the primary language spoken in their household was English. Respondents from the Town of Clinton were more racially and ethnically diverse than Clinton County respondents. Eighty percent of respondents reported their race/ethnicity as white, while two respondents (7.69%) selected Hispanic, Latino or Spanish origin. One respondent (3.85%) selected each of the following: American Indian, Asian/Pacific Islander, and Black/African American. The highest level of education completed by survey respondents was also diverse. 11.54% completed some high school but did not finish (almost 8% higher than Clinton County respondents); 26.92% obtained a high school diploma or GED; 26.92% completed some college or obtained a technical or trade school certificate, or an Associate's degree; 11.54% obtained a Bachelor's degree; and 23.08% obtained a Master's degree or higher. The household annual income reported by respondents in the Town of Clinton was lower than that of Clinton County respondents. More than half (53.85%) of respondents reported a household annual income of less than \$49,999 (more than 20 percentage points higher than Clinton County respondents) and only 34.61% reported a household annual income of more than \$50,000 (more than 20 percentage points lower than Clinton County respondents). The majority of respondents are employed full-time (53.85%), retired (19.23%), or employed part-time (11.54%). When asked if they had a primary care provider (PCP), almost 80% of respondents indicated they were being followed by a PCP. The breakdown for all respondents' responses to demographic questions can be found in Table 1.



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Definition of a Healthy Community

When asked whether they believed they live in a healthy community, 42.31% of respondents disagreed or strongly disagreed that they live in a healthy community, 19.23% agreed or strongly agreed, and 38.64% of respondents felt neutral toward this statement. Respondents were then asked to identify features of a strong, vibrant, healthy community. The top features reported by residents were affordable housing (73.08%); health care services (38.46%); a clean environment (26.92%); livable wages (26.92%); and drug and alcohol free communities (23.08%). The lowest ranked features were walkable and bike friendly communities (3.85%); diverse populations (7.69%); equality (7.69%); senior housing (7.69%); and transportation (7.69%). When compared to county responses, Town of Clinton residents were more likely to select affordable housing (40 percentage points) and senior services (10 percentage points) as top features. 
Health Challenges of Concern and Experienced

Town of Clinton residents identified access to dental care (46.15%); access to health care services (46.15%); overweight/obesity (38.46%); chronic disease (34.62%); and access to health care specialists (34.62%) as the top health related challenges of concern in the community. More than 88% of respondents reported that they or a family member experienced one or more health challenge in the past year. The top challenges reported were chronic disease (43.48%); access to health care specialists (34.78%); issues related to aging (34.78%); access to dental care (30.43%); and lung disease (30.43%).

More than one-third (34.78%) of respondents or a family member experienced issues related to aging as a health issue in the past year, though just 13% of respondents identified it as a health issue in the community. Similarly, 46.15% of respondents identified access to dental care as a challenge in the community, though less than one-third of them reported that they or a family member had difficulty accessing dental care within the past year. Additionally, more than 30% of respondents reported having trouble in accessing mental health services. One-third of respondents identified chronic disease as a health challenge in the community and over 43% of respondents reported it as a health challenge they or a family member experienced in the past year. Furthermore, nearly 47% of respondents identified access to health care services as a top health challenge in the community, while just over 34% reported having trouble accessing health care services. However, almost 70% of respondents reported they or a family member experienced at least one barrier to receiving medical care in the past year. The most reported barriers included; co-pays or deductibles were too high (44.44%), did not accept my insurance (33.33%), no specialist locally (27.78%), could not afford (22.22%), and no specialist appointment was available (22.22%). Social Challenges of Concern and Experienced

Town of Clinton residents identified affordable housing (65.38%), access to healthy foods (30.77%), childcare (30.77%), and lack of support for seniors (30.77%) as the top social challenges in the community. Almost 70% of respondents reported that they or a family member experienced at least one social



challenge in the past year. More than three-in-five (65.38%) respondents identified affordable housing as a top social concern in the community, while less than one third (27.78%) of respondents or their family members experienced issues with affordable housing within the past year. Similarly, 26.92% of respondents identified crime/vandalism as a social challenge in the community, though no respondents reported experiencing it in the past year. Half of respondents reported they or a family member experienced lack of a livable wage in the last year, however only about one-quarter (26.92%) of respondents identified it as a social challenge in the community. About one-third of (30.77%) respondents identified access to healthy food as a top social concern in the community and almost 30% (27.78%) experienced issues with accessing healthy food in their household within the past year. Environmental Concerns


More than half (53.85%) of residents identified aging infrastructure as a top environmental concern in the community. Two-in-five respondents (46.15%) identified drinking water quality as a top environmental concern, while 26.92% identified air pollution. Town of Clinton residents were less likely to select stream, river or lake quality (15.38%) and school safety (19.23%) than county residents (38.52% and 33.33% respectively). Self- Perceived Physical and Mental Health

The majority of respondents self-reported their physical health as average (46.15%), good (34.62%), or excellent (3.85%). Only 11.54% reported their physical health as poor and 3.85% reported their physical health as extremely poor. A similar pattern in responses was seen for self-reported mental health with 88.46% of respondents reporting their mental health as average, good or excellent; 7.69% of respondents reported their mental health as poor and 3.85% of respondents reported their mental health as extremely poor.
